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TMC, INC.

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To complete and perfect the location and equipment

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(e) To provide advice and technical and financial assistance to others in the management of their properties, affairs and business; to provide liaison for them in their business and financial dealings with Federal, State and local authorities and other public authorities; by advertisement, circular, radio, television and other media, information relating to the attractiveness of the territory of its operations as a place in which to locate or establish industrial and manufacturing facilities and the availability and terms of financial assistance and other services from governmental or private sources.

(f) To study and promote, among all in government, public service or local officials and interested groups, the economic growth, business prosperity, and the solution of civic problems, including its territory of operations.

(g) Pursuant to the accomplishment of the purposes herein specified, the Corporation shall have the following powers:

1. To borrow money from any Federal, State or local government source or from any private source; to loan or contribute money for the acquisition of its corporate purposes; to make, accept, exchange, execute and issue promissory notes, bills of exchange or other obligations or instruments from time to time, with or without security, for the acquisition, construction, rehabilitation or improvement of industrial or manufacturing plants or real or personal property pursuant to its contract with such obligations and the performance of any public works; to acquire or cause to be acquired the property of any corporation, business, partnership, firm, association or other organization; and to sell or otherwise dispose of any such obligations or any similar obligations of others contracted by it if payment of the corporate purposes.

2. To engage, employ, hire, retain, release, discharge or otherwise service, hold, use, introduce, develop and control, sell, exchange, or otherwise dispose of, hold, own, lease, license, and transfer to others such equipment, real estate and all types of property of every kind and character which may be required for the accomplishment of the purposes.

3. To apply for, obtain, register, trademark, license or otherwise service, hold, use, introduce, develop and control, sell, exchange, or otherwise dispose of, hold, own, lease, license, and transfer to others such equipment, real estate and all types of property of every kind and character which may be required for the accomplishment of the purposes.

4. To have one or more offices or places for permanent which will be located at New York and to carry on its operations from time to time at such other places.

5. To issue bills, notes, paper, and currency and coinage of every sort and kind which they may be requested by or convenient for the establishment and operation of the incorporation of business of a similar nature, with any persons, firms, corporations, private, public or mercantile, body politic and under the government of the United States of America and the State of New York so far as to the extent that the same may be done and performed by corporation laws of and under the Partnership Conference Law of the State of New York.

6. To purchase, subscribe to, sell and alienate, hold and dispose of the stocks, bonds and other securities or evidences of indebtedness of any other corporation or corporation, domestic or foreign, for whatever purpose or corporation, and in whatever business engaged, and to issue in payment thereof obligations or to pay them in cash or otherwise; to hold for investment, lease, sale, rental, hypothecation, deposit, loss, disposal of, and title to accounts, such stocks, bonds or other securities, and while the owner or holder thereof shall have a right to alienate and transfer of ownership, including the right to vote thereon for any purpose; to do any acts or things necessary, proper, convenient or desirable for the protection and development of any association or company of persons dealing in corporate property within the County of Columbia, New York for the payment of the value of any stock or such associations or corporations, for any sum or value assigned for any such purpose, the liability of which may be limited, suspended or retained as on the original issuance or corporation.
7. To purchase or obtain, lease or hold, or any interest in, any part of the business, stock and trade, business or any part, firm or corporation, and to establish any business or business of any such person, firm or corporation.
8. To do anything necessary, suitable or proper for the accomplishment of any of the purposes, and the exercise of any or all of the powers herein contained, in any manner, alone or with other corporation, firms or individuals, and either as principal or agent, to have and to hold, or to give, thing or things, money or otherwise, to or from, or spending one or more corporations which the corporation may propose or require for any of the rights, powers and privileges now or hereafter granted by the Laws of the State of New York upon corporations organized under the Membership Conference Law, or under any law, mandatory, statutory, general, special or in effect, in respect thereto.

ART. 2. Nothing contained in this instrument shall be construed

for the purpose of protection by some other party than the original owner.
